From a letter to the Corinthians by Saint Clement, Pope and Martyr

(Cap. 36, 1-2, 37-38: Funk 1, 145-149)

The preservation of unity



Beloved, Jesus Christ is our salvation, he is the high priest through whom we present our offerings and the helper who supports us in our weakness. Through him our gaze penetrates the heights of heaven and we see as in a mirror, the most holy face of God. Through Christ the eyes of our hearts are opened, and our weak and clouded understanding reaches up toward the light. Through him the Lord God willed that we should taste eternal knowledge, for Christ is the radiance of God's glory, and as much greater than the angels as the name God has given him is superior to theirs.

So then, my brothers, let us do battle with all our might under his unerring command. Think of the men serving under our military commanders. How well disciplined they are! How readily and submissively they carry out orders! Not everyone can be a prefect, a tribune, a centurion, or a captain of fifty, but each man in his own rank executes the orders of the emperor and the officers in command. The great cannot exist without those of humble condition, nor can those of humble condition exist without the great. Always it is the harmonious working together of its various parts that insures the well-being of the whole. Take our own body as an example: The head is helpless without the feet; and the feet can do nothing without the heart. Even our least important members are useful and necessary to the whole body, and all work together for its well-being in harmonious subordination.

Let us, then, preserve the unity of the body that we form in Christ Jesus, and let everyone give his neighbor the deference to which his particular gifts entitle him. Let the strong care for the weak and the weak respect the strong. Let the wealthy assist the poor and the poor man thank God for giving him someone to supply his needs. The wise man should show his wisdom not by his eloquence but by good works; the humble man should not proclaim his own humility, but leave others to do so; nor must the man who preserves his chastity ever boast of it, but recognize that the ability to control his desires has been given him by another.

Think, my brothers, of how we first came into being, of what we were at the first moment of our existence. Think of the dark tomb out of which our Creator brought us into his world where he had his gifts prepared for us even before we were born. All this we owe to him and for everything we must give him thanks. To him be glory for ever and ever. Amen.



Abide in Love:

There is a lot of advice out there on “How to stay in love,” in fact Googling that phrase will give you over two billion search results. I think that highlights two things: that loving someone is more than feeling it is a choice and that any relationship if it is to last, needs to operate in a mutual bond of love.

This is what Jesus highlights in today's Gospel. “As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love.” Abiding is more than just “staying in love” it is “*living* in love.” Just staying in love is good but Jesus asks for more. To live in love is to live in a way that is totally motivated and defined by that primary relationship of love. Like how having a child changes everything for newly wedded couples. This new relationship of parent and child, redefines the parents lives. Their love for the child becomes the focus on their mind and heart. They live for other person no matter the difficulty. This is living in love. And I think if you ask any parent they will tell you that their children are the best blessing in their lives. Living in love changes who you are in the best possible way.

How does this translate to living in God's love? To continue the analogy of parents and children, God is the Father who is constantly loving us. So what does the child do? Well, what do you wish your child did? Most likely to love you back and showing that by helping around the house, being respectful, being grateful, telling you that they love you, and by being obedient. This is how we live in God's love. In receiving God's love we live in it by reflecting it back to God in gratitude and thanksgiving, by radiating it towards others by kind acts and being joyful, and by internalizing it by living an upright life according to His commands as Jesus says “If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love.”

This last point of living in God's love, keeping his commands, may seem odd. But Jesus reinforces this idea when he says “you are my friends if you do what I command you.” Now if a person said that we could only be their friend if we followed a list of rules, we probably would not want to be friends with them in the first place. But in any relationship as we get to know the other person, their likes and dislikes we come to know what things hurt them and we try our best to avoid doing those things. And while we may slip and do those things that hurt the relationship we ask forgiveness and try harder. It is not overly burdensome, and we do not do it out of obligation as much as we do it out of love of the other person. Likewise with God, there are things that hurt Him and our relationship with Him. And to live in love means that we obey not out of fear but out of love.

An example to illustrate what “living in love” looks like is a friend of mine who has discerned to joined the Franciscan Sisters of the Eucharist. Before she started “living in love” her relationship with God was very formal. She went to Church, said her prayers, did all the right things she was taught to do. But she was not very happy, she felt empty. It was not until she looked at her faith again and saw how much that God really loved her personally, that she found herself. Before she was insecure now she knows who she is. Before she was empty now she is full. She is someone who is “living in love.” What she is doing has not changed. She goes to Church, says her prayers (albeit more of them and more frequently), and still follows all the rules. But now the motivations have changed and the dynamic has changed. Before what was formal is now more personal. What was forced is now done freely. This does not mean there will not be any difficulties, but it does mean that we will be able to overcome the difficulties with greater capacity.

Living in the love of God does not make the difficulties of life go away, but they give us a renewed reason to face them. They secure us in a relationship that stabilizes us in an ever changing world. While it may be hard to live in love, one way to try to start living in love is to thank God for one thing at the end of each day. Even for something as small as the sunshine.




